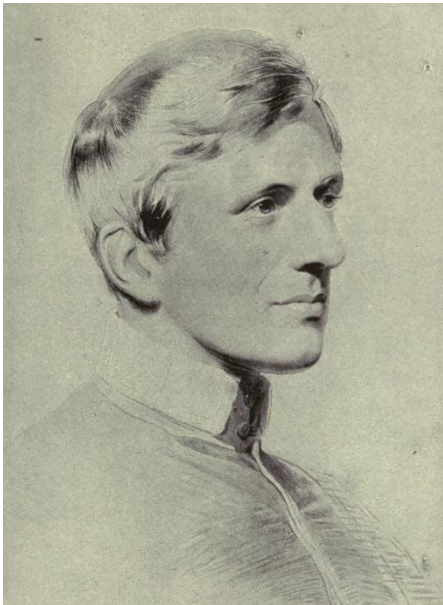


'Cor ad cor loquitur'
